N.C. JOURNALIST OF THE YEAR SEES A SPIKE

Scholarship amounts to increase for all winners of North Carolina competition

This year, our state's Journalist of the Year competition will see a substantial increase in the amount of scholarship dollars from N.C. Press Foundation, and the NCSMA office is making it easier for students to submit their work electronically.

The North Carolina High School Journalist of the Year will now receive \$3,000, an increase of \$1,000, in scholarship money. The winner's journalism program will receive \$500. In addition, three alternates will be selected to receive \$1,000 each, and the alternates' high school journalism programs will each receive \$250.

Starting this year, a student may use PDF templates provided by NCSMA to create writing, design and photography samples. Students may download the forms, fill them out, upload their work and they're done.

If students prefer to create an online portfolio or to mail in a notebook portfolio, NCSMA will accept those options, as well.

The North Carolina High School Journalist of the Year will be eligible to compete in the National High School Journalist of the Year competition, which will award an additional \$2,500 cash scholarship to the national winner.

Always remember who helped along the way

Open my wallet and you won't always find a lot of cash, but you will find a fortune I pulled from a cookie years ago. It reads, "Gratitude is not only the greatest of virtues, but the parent of all others."

As I consider this year's celebration for the 75th anniversary of the NCSMA, I cannot help but think of the foundation laid by all of those who came before me in this organization. And, I believe most of us — no matter the field — have at least a handful of people whom we consider as instrumental in our careers and personal successes: teachers, mentors, parents, coaches. The gratitude that we feel for these individuals, though not always outwardly expressed, is obvious.

The notion of the importance of gratitude underpins my role as a journalism teacher and newspaper adviser. As I strive to become a better adviser, I continue to learn from those whom I have admired or sought guidance from in the journalism field through the years: Sammye Johnson, Kay Phillips, H.L. Hall, Brenda Gorsuch, Robin Sawyer and Bill Allen, among others. It has been 30-something years (dare I do the math?) since I began my career working in the field of journalism and later teaching it. The memories of my own journey to this point — the moments of uncertainty, the challenges to overcome, the successes and failures — undoubtedly guide my efforts to teach my student journalists.

These students confront a very different world than that of my youth — one that is often very frightening and fast-paced. Yet, despite all of the changes, the foundations of excellent journalism are the same, and the journalism adviser for this generation of students must remember that fact.

Truth. Fairness. Good taste. Integrity. Responsibility. The list to aim for is lengthy and challenging but evermore important. In our hectic digital world, the rush to be first or to achieve some more selfish, personal goal too often overshadows the importance of getting the information right and doing what is right. So, on a typical day, I hope to have helped my students to think deeply and critically about what truly matters: not to be perfect but to make the right decisions in

> the given circumstances. I hope to have encouraged and inspired them, even if that is only in some seemingly insignificant way. And, if they learn something of value to take with them on their own journey, I have done my job, but more so, I am grateful that I had the opportunity to help them take at least one step forward on that challenging road to personal and professional success.

As someone who came into the teaching profession rela-

tively late in life, I am still far from what I ultimately hope to be as an adviser. My goal is to get a bit closer to that each year and to all those who have helped me along the way: Thank you.

How to integrate social media with your publication

It was only when professional newscasters, ones who exemplified American trust from their seat on national news networks, started reciting Facebook comments during their broadcasts that the prominence of social media sunk in.

No longer was it just where we show our great times with friends and where grandmothers send their grandkids requests to play Farmville, but a method of advertising and other official business. And high school publications are beginning to realize its full potential.

Here's how your publication can take advantage of social media:

1. Pick the right platform. Ask yourself what is it you want to accomplish with your social media page. Facebook is useful in communicating with parents, and users expect posts once a month, or even once every couple of months. Twitter is great for community engagement, spreading flash news and sharing pictures, but followers expect almost daily updates. Instagram is great for yearbooks as a photo-sharing platform. Tumblr, with a combination of text and image-based posts and a user-base that tends to aspiring artists and writers, may be a good option for literary magazines.

2. Create a social media plan. Who is running your social media campaigns? Do students post without checking in with their adviser? Do you want to link-in with your school's student council? What is your mission for each website? What are some realistic goals? Are there any other accounts that exemplify how you want to use your own?

3. Get followers from your school. The trickiest questions for any social media account is getting people to follow you and

getting them engaged. A good strategy is to link-up with other social media accounts from your school. Always get students on staff to retweet, reblog or whatever else to get the account noticed. Have other school publications advertise for you. Figure out what students at your school want (often pictures of themselves or publicity of their work).

4. Research other Internet tools. So-

cial media isn't the only thing the Internet can offer. Newspapers often have their own integrated websites — we have a whole category to judge them at NCSMA. School news broadcasts might have a YouTube to save their best work. The literary magazine staff I'm a part of at Providence Senior High has its own website to keep people updated on awards, to accept submissions and to showcase some of the work on the magazine.

The website, Issuu, is specifically used for publishing publications online.

The uses of the Internet seem to end only where your creativity ends, so when you're searching around online, be thinking of how you can utilize the tools.

Welcome to North Carolina Scholastic Media Association

The North Carolina Scholastic Media Association (NCSMA) is a statewide organization that promotes excellence in scholastic journalism through education of its members, encourages respect for freedom of the press, promotes professional growth of journalism teachers and advisers, and speaks for scholastic media in matters of curriculum and instruction that affect journalism education in North Carolina. NCSMA serves scholastic journalism and works for its advancement. It is based in the School of Journalism and Mass Communication at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

workshops

- The N.C. Scholastic Media Institute is a journalism workshop in mid-June. It offers practical experience in online news, broadcasting, desktop publishing, literary magazine, newspaper, photojournalism and yearbook.
- State student and adviser officers, elected by NCSMA members each year, plan workshops and NCSMI. Student officers may schedule retreats and planning sessions to increase student participation in the statewide organizations.
- The Association has divided North Carolina into eight geographic regions where workshops are held annually. Advisers and students are welcome to attend any regional workshop.

awards

- Critique services offer annual opportunities for students and staffs to distinguish themselves. Experts in literary magazine, newspaper and yearbook production judge publications.
- All publications that receive an All-North Carolina rating in the evaluation compete for Tar Heel Awards. Judges review the top publications in the categories to determine the best.
- Students may also submit individual work in writing and design for awards.

adviser training

- Courses that may be taken include "Journalism Education in the Secondary School," basic training for advisers tasks with newspapers, yearbooks, literary magazines and desktop publishing; "Mass Communication Law in the Secondary School;" "Writing and Editing for Secondary School Media;" "Desktop Publishing and Design for Secondary School Publications;" "Teaching Online News in the Secondary School" and "Teaching Photojournalism in the High School."
- NCSMA offers fellowships to advisers to help them take these graduate-level courses. Designed to cover full tuition and lodging for each adviser, the fellowships are competitive and are based on application information.

scholarships

Each year the N.C. Student Journalist of the Year is selected from among the top graduating seniors in scholastic journalism programs across the state. Entrants are evaluated by journalism professionals and faculty. The winner receives the Rachel Rivers-Coffey Scholarship from the N.C. Press Association Foundation and is eligible to compete for scholarships in the national Journalism Education Association contests.

Cape Fear Academy director named Principal of the Year

Encouraging. Enthusiastic. Sensitive. These are words used to describe Hugh McManus, the Upper School Director of Cape Fear Academy. McManus is the winner of the NCSMA Principal of the Year Award.

Jan Reid, the publications adviser at Cape Fear, wrote a letter recommending McManus. "While he offers advice he does not command and has backed me every time something controversial has appeared in our newspaper or yearbook," she wrote.

McManus has been at Cape Fear since 2006, when he moved from Topsail High School in Hampstead.

McManus was also the principal at Hoggard High School in Wilmington from 1988 to 1997.

"He is my advocate in so many ways, encouraging students to enroll in the course, to attend summer camps, to submit publications for evaluation and finding ways to fund our attendance," Reid wrote.

Current student Robert Judge said McManus is involved in the class.

"We have a joint class with both newspaper and yearbook and whenever we publish a newspaper he sends out an email," Judge said. "He makes sure everyone at school knows who's working on it and who the editors are, and makes sure everyone knows how hard the adviser is working."

In February 2015, Sam Doughton was selected to receive the 2015 Rachel Rivers-Coffey Journalist of the Year Award from the N.C. Press Foundation. Doughton, the editor-in-chief of R.J. Reynolds High School's newspaper for the 2014-15 school year, was on the newspaper staff for three years. He is a freshman at UNC-Chapel Hill this fall and plans to study journalism. He spoke with Rush reporter Jazmine Hedgepeth about the application process and the viral column that he believes helped him.

How did you feel when winning this award?

SD: My adviser believed our staff had a lot of qualified applicants, so I just said 'Well hey, let me apply and try this out.' Because I would love to continue journalism after college, and I thought it would be a cool thing to do. Turned in my portfolio, and surprisingly got a word back sometime in February that I won.

What made your portfolio stand out from other applicants?

SD: I think the main thing that made me stand out from other qualified candidates was that I wrote a story on an alumnus from my school, Stuart Scott. He died late January, and the very next day, I wrote a column on Scott's death and his impact on my life. It got a lot of play, it was viewed about 10,000 times on our website alone,got tweeted out by ESPN's College Basketball, even members of the Scott family commented on the online article. That was really cool and somewhat was my hook to the award, saying 'Hey look, I'm a student journalist whose piece was broadcasted nationally."

What advice do you have for future seniors wanting to apply for the Journalist of the Year award? SD: Just go for it. A lot of it starts when you first join the staff. One thing that's really helped me out is asking your editors questions. I know a lot of the editors ahead of me gave me really great advice on other things like that. Lean on your advisor as well. He or she is there to help you out. Three tips: Start preparing your portfolio early, commit to doing journalistic work now, no matter if you start your freshman, sophomore, or junior year, just start as soon as you can to create the best portfolio. Lean on your advisers, editors and all of the supporting staff that you have around you.

SPLC director, Cape Fear Academy adviser receive Kay Phillips awards

Cape Fear Academy's Jan Reid honored

It takes a real love of teaching to come out of retirement after a 28-year career.

That's exactly what Jan Reid did.

Reid is the publications adviser for the Upper School at Cape Fear Academy in Wilmington. She is being honored by the North Carolina Scholastic Media Association with the Kay Phillips Distinguished Service Award for her 37 years of service as a journalism educator.

Robert Judge '16, a rising senior at Cape Fear, enjoys Reid's class. "She puts a ridiculous amount of time into all our publications," Judge said. "She also makes sure we have all the technology we need to get work done."

Reid joined the Cape Fear in 2006 after serving as a journalism teacher at Hoggard High School. She has also served as a summer workshop faculty member for NCSMA, Taylor and Herff Jones.

"She has been a faithful supporter of NCSMA for many many years," NCSMA Director Monica Hill said. "She has story after story about students who have gone on to do great things."

Judge said Reid deserves the award. "Even though she may prefer the yearbook or the newspaper more, she never shows it," Judge said. "Mrs. Reid is probably one of the best teachers we've ever had."

SPLC'S Frank LoMonte wins service award

Most high school and college journalists know who to call if they face censorship: Frank LoMonte.

The executive director of the Student Press Law Center is a familiar face at state and national journalism conventions and a welcoming voice on the phone.

LoMonte was honored with the NCSMA Kay Phillips Distinguished Service Award at the advisers lunch on June 15 for his service to NCSMA and his work protecting student press freedoms.

LoMonte's path to the SPLC had stops in journalism and law. He uses this experience to advise high school and college journalists about censorship and press freedom.

LoMonte has also worked closely with UNC-Chapel Hill and NCSMA on a variety of projects, including a law symposium marking the 25th anniversary of the Supreme Court decision Hazelwood v. Kuhlmeier.

"He was the person who pitched the idea of the Hazelwood Symposium," said Monica Hill, director of NCSMA. "It was a tremendous honor for the law school, for the journalism school and for NCSMA to be involved in it."

Hill appreciates LoMonte's work. "We are very fortunate in North Carolina that he travels down every year for the Institute to teach sessions. It's a wonderful thing for students at our Institute to experience."

TUITION WAIVER OFFERED FOR 'TEACHING INTERACTIVE MEDIA'

NCSMA offers fellowship funding to high school journalism advisers

NCSMA's Journalism Education Fellowship Program allows teachers to enroll in a one-week, short-term summer course with tuition funding provided by NCSMA.

N.C. journalism teachers and media advisers can qualify for free in-state tuition, lodging and books through this program. The fellowships, awarded on a first-come, first-served basis, are valued at \$1,230.

The short-term course will be scheduled July 10-16. Class meets 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Advisers may earn three hours of graduate credit.

Teaching Interactive Media

The summer course for 2016 will introduce educators to basic journalistic interactive design and production concepts, as well as web development and Wordpress.

Producing effective interactive projects requires skill sets. This course will address those skill sets, plus offer a section on how to teach technology concepts in the secondary classroom.

The course will include the following topics:

 Website layout using HTML, CSS, a web editing program and a content management system (Wordpress).

- Interactive graphics using online tools
 - Use of data, photography, graphics, artwork, audio, video and the written word for online audiences.
- Solid, ethical journalistic decision-making.

Professor Steven King of the UNC School of Media and Journalism will teach the course. If your students hope to improve their interactive media skills, consider applying for the fellowship and exploring ways to teach and advise interactive media.

Priority deadline is April 1.

CHANGES TO N.C. JOURNALIST OF THE YEAR SUBMISSIONS

This year, NCSMA is offering three options for submitting portfolios for the North Carolina Journalist of the Year scholarships.

- PDF format Students may submit their portfolio materials as a PDF, or PDFs, emailed to ncsma@unc.edu with the subject line "NC JOY." They may use the templates provided at ncsma.unc.edu/students.
- **Notebook** Students may compile their application materials into a notebook (typically a binder), with samples of their work printed out and included in the notebook.
- **Online portfolio** Students may use a free web hosting service, such as Weebly or WordPress, to compile their application materials. The online portfolio should include samples of the student's work, as well as the entry material (application, essay and personal photo). Letters of recommendation and transcripts may be mailed to the NCSMA office.

And students will submit work from at least five of the following categories:

• **News Gathering** — Shows evidence of background research, knowledge of formulating and asking well-informed questions and use of credible sources and research.

- **Writing** Demonstrates ability to analyze, evaluate and synthesize information from diverse sources to produce content for a variety of media.
- **Editing** Mastery of AP and specific publication style; identifies strengths/weaknesses in own and others' work.
- **Design** Samples of published work that show a basic understanding of design elements
- **Multimedia broadcast** Samples demonstrate unique storytelling moments, high quality photographs, effective cutlines/captions.
- **Web** Samples reflect ability to execute and plan timely news coverage.
- Law & Ethics Demonstrates knowledge of law; addresses ethical dilemmas; reveals the reasoning behind his or her work.
- Leadership & Team Building
- News Literacy Demonstrates ability to assess and improve the credibility of a news story by using knowledgeable sources.
- **Entrepreneurship** Demonstrates knowledge of the media business.



- Entry materials in the notebook or PDF options should not exceed 40 pages with application materials not to exceed an additional 10 pages as follows:

- The online portfolio must have all of the material listed above (including links to samples, an autobiographical essay, resume, photos, etc). If you choose this option, mail in recommendations and transcripts. For instructions on building an online portfolio, go to ncsma.unc.edu/students.

- Samples of work should be carefully selected. Provide judges with a good cross section of your best work rather than everything ever produced. Date, name of publication and relevance should accompany each sample, as well as an explanation/reasoning for each example. If you are sending in PDF versions of your samples, go to ncsma.unc.edu/students to find a template. A 25-50 word explanation should include any difficulties or special circumstances encountered during the assignment and why this entry was selected for the portfolio.
